"MVCC is at the center of this community's economic, intellectual, and lifestyle aspirations," says Zogby. "I am proud to invest in the college's future, and I am tremendously excited to see what pivotal role MVCC will play in the Mohawk Valley's future." As chair, Zogby will lead a team of community leaders to solicit community investment in MVCC. Campaign goals and other details will be publicly announced as the campaign gets underway.


Zogby's connections to the college go back to when he was an instructor from 1977-81, and numerous members of his family have studied or taught at the college since then. Zogby has worked frequently with the college, most recently as a volunteer consultant to the President's Cabinet and Board of Trustees on trends in student demographics and as the organizer of this summer's public lecture by Ralph Nader.

Zogby has had deep impact on the college and community through his founding role at Zogby International, which is widely proclaimed as one of the world's top polling firms. The firm has distinguished itself with a sterling record for accuracy in predicting too-close-to-call elections and its high profile in the media has made Zogby a household name in America and beyond. John Zogby has furthered these explorations as a pundit and the author of books including "The Way We'll Be." His columns appear regularly in publications including the Huffington Post, Wall Street Journal, and U.S. News & World Report.

"John's dynamism and deep intellect are the perfect fit for our college, and his willingness to volunteer in many ways reinforces his dedication to this community," says MVCC President Randall VanWagoner, Ph.D.

Adds VanWagoner, "All signs point to this being the right time for our college to go into campaign. There is greater need for what a community college provides, strong community support, MVCC's growing momentum, and ever more creative partnerships with our alumni, businesses, and others. Hysell helps MVCC's sister college in Vietnam

For the second time in six months, a delegate from the MVCC faculty has visited the College's sister community col-

lege in Vietnam. Last month Associate Professor William Hysell made the trip to Kien Giang Community College.

Hysell spent 15 days, October 15-30, in the city of Rach Ghia in the Mekong Delta. The purpose of his trip was to share information regarding incorporating critical thinking into classroom instruction.

"Most education there is based on rote memorization," said Hysell, who interacted with teachers, administrators and students

at the college. "I observed classes, gave three presentations, taught a class and worked with students interested in improving their English."

Hysell left Syracuse on Friday, Oct. 15, at 6:00 a.m. and flew to Chicago. From there he flew 15 hours to Hong Kong and then another 2 ½ hours to Ho Chi Minh City. "I arrived in Vietnam at 10:30 on October 16. The trip back was stranger since I left Vietnam at 6:15 a.m. on Saturday, October 30 and arrived in Syracuse on Saturday, October 30 at 8:30 p.m. It was a long Saturday," said Hysell.

The city of Rach Ghia is a seven hour minibus ride from Ho Chi Minh City (Saigon).

At Kien Giang Community College, classes start at 7:00 a.m. and run until 9:00 p.m. Classes are run seven days a week.

"My impressions of Vietnamese culture can be summed up as resilient, adaptable and balanced. Resilient in the sense that this is a country that has been invaded numerous times and always seems to bounce back; adaptable in terms of the populace's ability to cope with weather, political and technological changes and balanced in the sense of how everything seems to flow together and get done although not necessarily in the linear ways we Westerners are used to," said Hysell, who gave a presentation via Skype to MVCC students during his trip.

There are plans to expand on exchanges with Kien Giang Community College.

Hysell's advice for those who travel to Vietnam: Prepare for a long trip and plan to be surprised.


Students learn about volunteer opportunities

Metz: 'Every day is Veterans Day'

Ron Metz, who served in the Marines and is the current president of the Veterans Club at MVCC, spoke no truer words during the Veterans Day Service outside of the Academic Building on the Utica Campus on Thursday: "Every day is Veterans Day."

That was the energy in the air as the Proctor High School ROTC Honor Guard raised the American Flag over the quad and then lowered it to half-staff while a bugler sounded "Taps." The flag was then raised to full-staff.

"These men and women who today serve in all branches of the military are a special breed," said Oneida County Executive Anthony Picente. "For what they do for this country, 24-7, is an incredible task. Keeping this country safe is an act of love."

Picente went on to talk about how our fathers fought in World War II, but rarely mentioned the horrors of what they saw or the triumphs of the individual. "They felt it was not about them. It was about serving. It was about honor. It was about dedication. It was about love for their families and country," said Picente.
